1. Introduction

It is school policy that all children wear school uniform when attending school or when participating in a school organised event outside normal school hours.

The policy for school uniform is based on the notion that school uniform:

- promotes a sense of pride in the school;
- engenders a sense of community and belonging towards the school;
- is practical and smart;
- makes children feel equal to their peers in terms of appearance;
- is regarded as suitable wear for school and is considered by parents/carers as good value for money.

The school uniform policy is an integral part of the school's commitment to equality and inclusion. The governing body believes the school uniform policy allows all pupils to establish a shared identity and celebrate what they have in common, whilst respecting diversity.

We wish to see the learners with the school logo on their jumper, polo shirt and PE KIT, but this is not compulsory.

The school will also facilitate opportunities for parents to buy second-hand school clothes (which have the school logo on them) on an ongoing basis through contacting the school.

If in doubt, please check with the school office before purchasing items for wearing in school.

2. The School Uniform

Year 7 - 11

All pupils

- tidy black trousers / black skirt of an appropriate length (no tracksuit trousers)
- red school polo shirt
- green school sweatshirt
- black shoes or plain black trainers - no Converse (except plain black Converse)

Year 12 + 13

All pupils:

- tidy black trousers / black skirt of an appropriate length (no tracksuit trousers)
- white shirt
- black school jumper
- school tie
- black shoes or plain black trainers - no Converse (except plain black Converse)

During the summer term, and outside of Physical Education lessons, pupils may choose to wear plain black shorts, or school shorts / skort if they wish. The shorter version of the school shorts are not permitted around the school, apart from in Physical Education lessons.

General information on school uniform

We do not allow;

- short skirts of an inappropriate length
- leggings
- tracksuit trousers
- ripped trousers

Physical Education

All pupils are expected to attend Physical Education lessons wearing a T-shirt and shorts / skort (or one of the other equivalent items instead of shorts), and suitable trainers. The additional items of the physical education uniform are optional.

3. Naming of uniform and lost property

Please make sure that all your child's clothes are clearly marked with the child's name. Shoes and trainers should also have names written inside. The school will endeavour to reunite lost named items with their owners. Unnamed lost property will be disposed of at the end of term or recycled.

4. Footwear

We encourage the children to wear black shoes / plain black trainers (with no other colour) to school. We believe that this contributes positively towards their appearance while attending school. School shoes must be safe and sensible for playground and indoor use. No narrow or raised heels are allowed.

5. Hair, jewellery, nails and make-up

The colouring of hair is not a part of the school's uniform. The school is not a fashion show either. We ask parents to make every effort to respect this rule. When required, unusual hairstyles will be discussed with parents.

Only 'studs' are allowed in terms of earrings because of health and safety reasons. No earrings should be worn for physical education lessons. We allow pupils to use natural-looking make-up.

It should be ensured that nails do not cause a health and safety hazard. Nails are expected to be of reasonable length, and suitable for Food Technology and Physical Education lessons.

As a school, we have the right to decide on what is and what is not acceptable to wear in school.

If for religious reasons, children are required to wear any special items of clothing, then this will be discussed with parents / carers in a sensitive and sensible way.
